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## What is AMI?

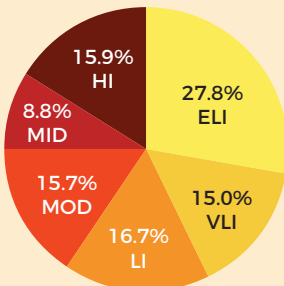
AMI stands for Area Median Income. It is calculated and released every year by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

HUD defines 100% AMI as the median household income for the New York City metropolitan area. This includes the incomes of households in all five boroughs along with surrounding Westchester, Putnam, and Rockland counties.

New York City uses AMI levels to set income qualifications and rents for affordable housing.

AMI levels are calculated based on both household income and household size. AMI levels presented in this chart are for a 3-person household.

ANHD's AMI Cheat Sheet is a general guide. It does not report exact rents or share of New York City population for any AMI level. <sup>1</sup>High Income is not an actual affordable housing category and is used here simply for labeling purposes. HPD's highest affordable housing category is Middle Income, classified as 121-165% AMI.

<sup>2</sup>AMI levels are the upper limit of the income range; for example, 10% AMI represents 0-10% AMI and \$0-9,390.

<sup>3</sup>Income for a three-person family that corresponds to the listed AMI level.

<sup>4</sup>Maximum rents affordable to each AMI level. Rents are calculated using the 30% standard of affordability (30% of monthly income). Gross affordable rents are adjusted for some utility costs.

<sup>5</sup>Share of New York City Population is calculated using the 2016 American Community Survey (ACS) Public Use Microdata Sample (PUMS).



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
